A Certification Framework for Defensible AI-Assisted Investigation - This presentation introduces AI Investigative Methodology (AIM), a discipline modeled on the path digital forensics took a generation ago: from ungoverned practice to a certified, court-defensible standard. AIM rests on three components — a peer-reviewed framework defining competency domains and evidentiary standards, a certification program training investigators to construct, validate, and document AI-assisted analysis, and SIGNAL, an open, GitHub-style library of vetted investigative prompts paired with a policy engine that keeps investigators inside their agency's own CJIS-aligned rules automatically.
